



Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program Client Eligibility

- Citizenship: Clients are not required to be U.S. citizens
- **Gender:** Female; transgender woman who has taken or is currently taking hormone therapy; or transgender man who has not had a bilateral mastectomy and/or total hysterectomy
- Income: At or below 250% FPL
- Insurance: Must be uninsured





Breast Cancer Screening Program Client Eligibility

- Aged 18-39 years: Symptomatic or asymptomatic and high-risk
- Aged 40-64 years
- Aged 65 years or older: Without Medicare Part B are eligible





Breast Cancer Screening Program Covered Services

- Mammograms
- Diagnostic mammograms
- Breast ultrasounds
- Breast biopsies
- Breast tomosynthesis
- Clinical breast exams





Cervical Cancer Screening Program Client Eligibility

- Aged 21-29 years: Symptomatic or asymptomatic and no Pap test completed in three years
- **Aged 30-64 years:** Symptomatic or asymptomatic and no Pap test completed in 3 years or no Pap test with the HPV test in 5 years
- Aged 65 years and older: Without Medicare Part B





Cervical Cancer Screening Program Covered Services

- Pap tests
- Colposcopies
- Follow-up surgical and colposcopy consultations
- HPV testing for clients 30 years of age and older, following ASCUS Pap result or if used as co-testing





Colorectal Cancer Screening Program Client Eligibility

- **Residency:** 1 year prior to application submission
- Age: 50 years and older
- Income: At or below 250% FPL
- Insurance: Uninsured or underinsured
- Previous Colonoscopies: Rescreen will be made case-by-case if less than 10 years





Colorectal Cancer Screening Program Covered Services

- Colonoscopy pre-operative consultation fees
- Colonoscopy procedures
- Facility fees
- Sedation or anesthesia fees
- Metabolic panels
- Level IV surgical pathology, and gross and microscopic examinations



Environmental Approaches for Sustainable Cancer Control

- Wyoming Cancer Program, Wyoming State Parks, and Impact Melanoma partnered on a Wyoming sunscreen initiative
- The program purchased automatic sunscreen dispensers and sunscreen refills
- Installed 26 dispensers in all 19 state parks, including historic sites and trailheads, and has a request to purchase 13 more dispensers
- 4,000,000 people visited Wyoming state parks last year








Types of navigation:


- Network with state-wide navigators

- Program Nurses navigate women needing resources for breast and cervical cancer screenings. Now CDC supported





- As of July 01, 2018, all claims for the WBCCSP and WCCSP need to be submitted electronically through the Medicaid web portal or clearinghouse
- Submit claim within 3 months of the date of service, must be dated within 12 months of the date of service
- Required reports must be attached to the claim. If the attachment is not received within 30-days of the electronic claim submission, the claim will be denied
- The WCP is the payer of last resort

The key to life after cancer is early detection.



Know when to get your cancer screening



Males age 21-29

 No cancer screening recommended at this time. Males at an increased risk for cancer due to family history, genetic disorders or other factors, should speak with their doctor about screenings.

Males age 30-39

 No cancer screening recommended at this time. Males at an increased risk for cance due to family history, genetic disorders or other factors, should speak with their doctor about screenings.



Males age 40-49

 At age 45, males at an increased risk for prostate cancer due to family history, genetic disorder or other factors, should speak with their doctor about screenings

Males age 50-64

- At age 50, males should screen for colorectal cancer.
- At age 50, males at average risk for prostate cancer should speak with their doctor about screenings.
- At age 55, males with a history of smoking should speak with their doctor about lung cancer screenings.



Males age 65 and older

- Colorectal cancer screenings are recommended until age 75. At age 76, speak with your doctor about the need for continued screenings.
- Males with a history of smoking should speak with their doctor about lung cancer screenings.

Know when to get your cancer screening



Females age 21-29

 At age 21, females should have a Pap test every 3 years. HPV tests recommended if Pap test is abnormal.

Females age 30-39

 At age 30, females should get a Pap test and HPV test every 5 years or can continue to get a Pap test every 3 years.



Females age 40-49

- Pap test and HPV test should continue every 5 years or a Pap test every 3 years
- At age 40, females at an increased risk for breast cancer due to family history, genetic disorder or other factors should speak with their doctor about screenings.

Females age 50-64

- Pap test and HPV test should continue every 5 years or a Pap test every 3 years.
- At age 50, females should get mammograms every 2 years.
- At age 50, females at average risk for colorectal cancer should get screenings.
- At age 55, females with a history of smoking should speak with their doctor about lung cancer screenings.



Females age 65 and older

- Mammograms every 2 years should continue until age 74.
- Colorectal cancer screenings are recommended until age 75. At age 76, speak with your doctor about the need for continued screenings.
- Females with a history of smoking should speak with their doctor about lung cancer screenings until age 80.


