

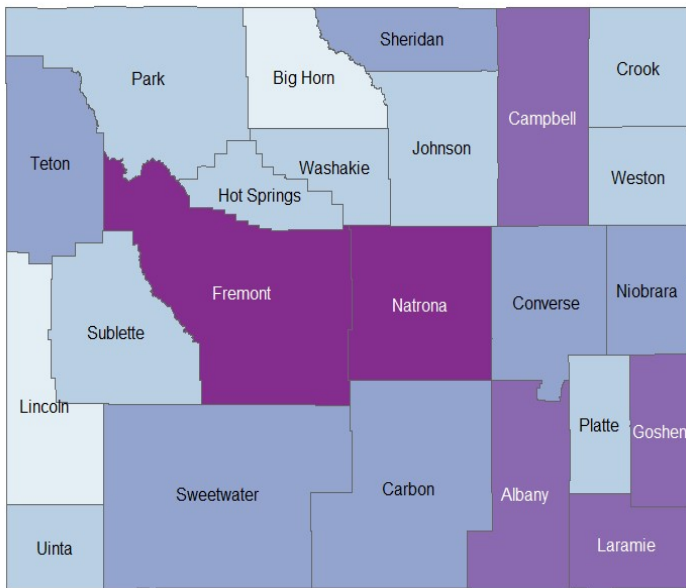
CHLAMYDIA IN WYOMING

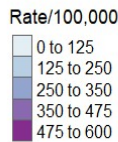
Chlamydia is a sexually transmitted bacterial infection. Approximately 75% of females and 50% of males infected with chlamydia show no symptoms. If symptoms do occur, they present within one to three weeks after exposure.

Symptoms may include abnormal discharge from the infected site, burning during urination, itching, and pain during intercourse. If left untreated, chlamydia can cause pelvic inflammatory disease (PID). Symptoms of PID can include abdominal pain, fever, and chronic pelvic pain. PID can damage the fallopian tubes and cause infertility. Individuals infected with chlamydia are at greater risk for HIV infection.

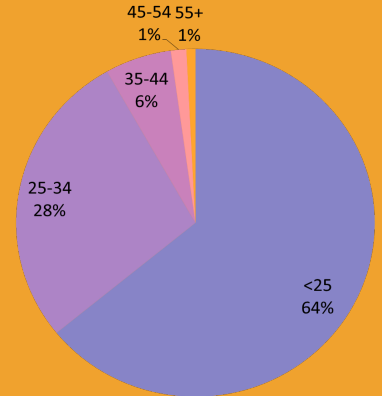
Wyoming Chlamydia Rates by County 2016 - 2020

10% of chlamydia cases in 2020 reported inconsistently (sometimes) using condoms

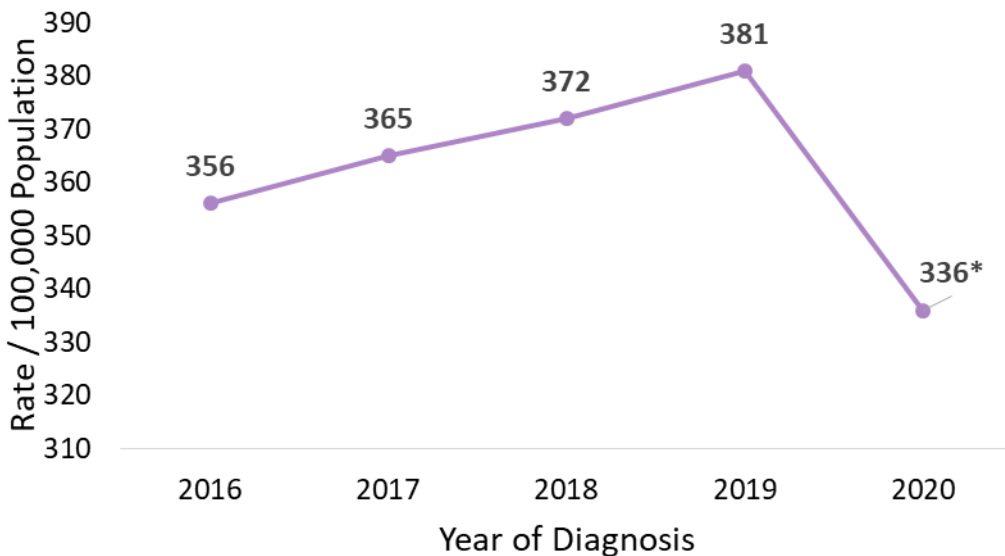
New Chlamydia Diagnoses by Age 2020
