2021 HIV in Wyoming

HIV, or Human Immunodeficiency Virus, is the virus that can lead to AIDS (Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome) – now called HIV Stage 3. HIV is transmitted through unprotected sex, blood-to-blood contact, and mother-to-child through birth and breastfeeding.

Over **four-fifths, (85.7%)** of new cases in 2021 were among white males.


During 2021, there were **seven** cases of HIV reported.




2021 Cases

HIV Stage 3 (AIDS)

In 2021, **28.6%** of newly diagnosed HIV cases were diagnosed as **HIV Stage 3 (AIDS**). The data suggest that almost one-third of newly diagnosed cases in 2021 were not tested early, which resulted in missed opportunities for prevention and treatment interventions.




Symptoms

New HIV Diagnosis Rates


The HIV rate significantly **decreased** during 2021; however, the impact of the **COVID-19 pandemic** may have contributed to the decreased rate.
