



COMMUNITY PREVENTION GRANT HIGHLIGHTS

Biennium Fiscal Year 2021/2022

BACKGROUND

The Wyoming Department of Health (WDH) funds a community prevention grant program through a combined effort of the Substance Use and Tobacco Prevention Program and the Injury and Violence Prevention Program. Each County that receives community prevention funding has a Community Prevention Specialist (CPS) who works with local coalitions to strengthen the prevention efforts in their community. Their focus areas include alcohol and other drugs (approximately 50% of funding), tobacco (approximately 25% of funding), and suicide prevention (approximately 25% of funding).

At both state and local levels, Wyoming employs a data-driven decision-making process. The ultimate goal is to create community-level change across Wyoming. Each CPS is tasked with collaborating with their local prevention coalitions and completing a comprehensive needs assessment that addresses all relevant data covering local demographics, socioeconomic conditions, community norms, and other risk/protective factors. The results of this assessment are used to create and implement local strategic plans that focus on policy changes, systems transformation, and information dissemination.

The following are highlights that illustrate some of the successes of the strategic plans from Biennium Fiscal Year (BFY) 2021/2022 Community Prevention Grant (CPG) cycle. Included are state-level highlights as well as highlights for each individual county.

TOBACCO PREVENTION

SUICIDE PREVENTION

- 6,019 People trained in suicide prevention supported by the WDH (includes CPG).
 - Clinicians completed a CAMS-Care training, which is a framework for suicide-specific assessment and treatment of a patient's suicidal risk.

- **6,027** Personal safety devices distributed including gun locks, medication lock boxes, and firearm safes.



SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION

- 22 Substance Abuse Prevention Capacity Assessments took place at the local level in partnership with the Wyoming Survey & Analysis Center.
- The Prescription Drug Abuse Toolkit was launched which includes education about prescription drug misuse and abuse, county and state-level data, capacity building strategies, and proven best practices for preventing high-risk behaviors.
- The State Epidemiological Outcomes Workgroup produced *Telling the Story of Stimulant Use in Wyoming*, a report on the many aspects of stimulant use in Wyoming to help stakeholders choose and implement targeted strategies and solutions for prevention and treatment.
- **1,146** Alcohol compliance checks were completed between July 2020 and May 2021.

TOBACCO PREVENTION

Big Brothers Big Sisters, Albany County School District, and the Coalition to Prevent Suicide and Substance Abuse (CoPSSA) are working together to offer INDEPTH and N-O-T, which are youth evidence-based cessation programs, to students and parents in Albany County.





SUICIDE PREVENTION

- **2** Fremont County Prevention Partnership Board members became certified safeTALK trainers.
- 32 Community members completed QPR, safeTALK, and ASIST during Suicide Prevention and Awareness Week in February 2022. This was a collaboration between FCSD #1 Project AWARE, Grace for 2 Brothers, Trinity Episcopal Church, and the Prevention Program.

Individuals were served during family day in 2021 (1,321) and 2022 (956). Fremont County Prevention Partnership and Suicide Prevention Taskforce collaborated with youth organizations and service providers at the Fremont County Fair to acquaint families and community members with Sources of Strength principles.

- Wind River Reservation youth participated during 2021-22 in Purpose of Life and Project Venture, a positive youth development approach, facilitated by White Buffalo Youth Prevention Program.
- Active members, several of which are Prevention Partnership Board members, are a part of the recently-formed Fremont County DUI Task Force, which is comprised of 5 subcommittees. Three enhanced enforcement operations were conducted during the 2021-22 fiscal year.

TOBACCO PREVENTION

Goshen County stakeholders including, but not limited to the Department of Family Services, County Attorney, Law Enforcement, Goshen County School District #1 (GCSD1), Comprehensive Community Coalition, and City/County Government spent months developing, building capacity, and implementing Prime for Life, a Youth Alternatives Program, to provide prevention and support to youth who have been cited for or are struggling with tobacco use.

SUICIDE PREVENTION

- Suicide prevention trainings were held during this grant cycle.
- High school and middle school youth and adults were trained and participated in Sources of Strength Training and Programming.
- 112 Community members were trained in suicide prevention, including high school students, afterschool program staff, St. Joseph's Children's Home staff, and GCSD1 faculty.

- 21 Beverage Servers from local establishments completed TIPS.
- Law Enforcement, DFS staff, GCSD1 staff and other stakeholders trained in "The Changing Face of Marijuana."
- Pounds of unused prescriptions collected, preventing them from being misused.
- **112** Deterra Drug Deactivation Systems distributed.



This led to pounds of unused prescriptions and other medications being collected during drug take back days and medication return drop boxes, preventing them from being used misused / abused.

- 2 Members of the police department were recertified to be TIPS Trainers.
- 13 Community members and beverage servers in local establishments completed TIPS.
- 1 Strengthening Families Program was implemented to build on protective factors by improving family relationships, parenting skills, and improving youth's social and life skills.
- Youth participated in monthly prevention activities, resulting from a partnership with Youth Alternatives. These activities focused on reducing risk factors, increasing protective factors, and promoting healthy development.





SUICIDE PREVENTION
