

## Wyoming Department of Health Reportable Diseases and Conditions

A report is required (Wyo.Stat. § 35-4-107) from the attending healthcare provider/hospital and the laboratory performing diagnostic testing.

**Diseases in Black** are reportable within 24 hours of diagnosis

**Diseases in Blue** are reportable within 7 days of diagnosis

**Prior to shipping**, all specimens **MUST** be logged via the WPHL Web Portal: <https://prod.labwebportal.com/wy/#/auth/login>

Electronic Laboratory Reporting (ELR) is the reporting of lab results through existing LIMS-WDH connections.

Results of rapid testing conducted by providers or facilities must be reported, with the exception of diseases denoted by footnote <sup>4</sup>

\* If carbapenemase (CP) testing is not available, submit all CRE, CRPA, and CRAB to the WPHL for screening.

<sup>1</sup> All healthcare facilities shall confer rights to the WDH for any facility-specific conditions reported through NHSN.

<sup>2</sup> Includes all test results of an infant born to a positive mother; and HBV DNA/HCV RNA tests regardless of result via ELR only.

<sup>3</sup> Includes all CD4s, all genotype results, all previous test results for newly diagnosed cases, all viral loads regardless of result, and all perinatal exposures.

<sup>4</sup> Hospital or reference laboratory ELR only.
